Proposed Definition

"threatening, controlling, coercive behaviour, violence or abuse (psychological, physical, verbal, sexual, financial or emotional) inflicted on <u>anyone</u> (irrespective of age, ethnicity, religion, gender or sexual orientation) by a current or former intimate partner or family member"

Did you know:



making our community safer

- Domestic Violence/Abuse costs the NI Economy approximately £180 million every year (Tackling Violence at Home Strategy 2005)
- Over 30% of domestic violence occurs in pregnancy (DOH 2005)
- Approximately 32,000 children are living with domestic violence/abuse in N. Ireland (UNICEF 2006)
- Nearly ¾ of children on the "At Risk" register live in a household where domestic violence/abuse occurs.(DOH 2002)



Domestic Violence in Context 2013-2014

- PSNI responded to 27,628 domestic abuse incidents across N. Ireland (+1.6%)
- Approx. one every 19 minutes of every day
- 12,720 domestic abuse crimes recorded (+14%)
- 7 murders with a domestic abuse motivation(41.2% of all murders)

- 1350+ 1-1 counselling hours offered (2012/13)




Who are our clients?

- Male victims of domestic abuse
- Men suffering from relationship breakdown
- Men & women experiencing powerful emotions (anger)
- All clients are over 18 years old

Why are men hard to reach?

- Knowledge of what constitutes domestic abuse
- Fear of losing contact with children
- Recognising that they are victims
- Fear of not being believed
- Stigma attached



Barriers to seeking support

- Think they will lose contact with their children
- Unaware of support services available
- Don't think they will be believed
- Ability to talk about situations
- Lack of localised services
- Pride



Statistics

• There were **27,628** domestic abuse <u>incidents</u> recorded in 2013/14

 There were 12,720 domestic abuse <u>crimes</u> recorded in 2013/14



Statistics

• **11,656** domestic abuse crimes were recorded where the victim's age and gender details were known:

•	Under 18:	1,568	13%
	Female 18+:	7,265	62%
•	Male 18+:	2,823	24%

Statistics

 A total of 674 male callers contacted the 24hr Domestic and Sexual Violence Helpline

From 1st April 2012 to 31st March 2013.

This was an increase of 198 male callers from the previous year.
